
Let us build peace within and spread it freely. Let us create belonging and imagine the future of Rotary afresh. Let us work together joyously and Create Hope in the World.

Trustee Chair's Message



love Rotary for many reasons, perhaps most of all for the impact we make when we work together. There is really no other group like us. In the last five years, The Rotary Foundation has helped 100 million beneficiaries. That is staggering.

But the need is great. There are countless more we could be reaching and supporting right now if we had the resources. We could reach twice as many in the next five years. And your fellow Rotaractors and Rotarians are ready to help. They're hungry for more grants to help more people who need us.

That's why, this year, The Rotary Foundation Trustees have set an ambitious goal for giving of \$500 million, our highest ever.

This breaks down to \$150 million for the Annual Fund to help fund grants and \$50 million for polio eradication, to be matched by \$100 million from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. For the **Endowment Fund and our** future, we are targeting \$60 million in outright giving and \$80 million in commitments, totaling \$140 million. And we want to collect \$60 million in other contributions, such as direct giving, cash for global grants, and Disaster Response Fund donations.

To make this happen, we need all of you — each and every Rotarian and Rotaractor.

Did you know that over 80 percent of Rotary members make no contributions to PolioPlus, or that over 60 percent make no donation at all to The Rotary Foundation? For an organization of 1.4 million members, that means that nearly 1 million of us are not contributing each year. Imagine the tremendous difference it would make if each of those 1 million could contribute just \$25 a year. That would be \$25 million we wouldn't need to raise from

our best donors.

We can all give something. That's why I am asking each of you to set a goal to give what you can to The Rotary Foundation this year.

Never have we set such an audacious goal, but I believe that you, who make up Rotary, always respond to a challenge, especially when you see the difference we can make with those funds. We are part of an audacious organization, one that dreams big and makes our dreams a reality.

Let's think bigger and differently this year, so we can meet our goal and do more to Create Hope in the World. In this way, we will make the Rotary year ahead an unforgettable one, not just for ourselves, but most importantly, for those whose lives we will soon touch.



"MEMBERSHIP AND CLUB GROWTH" With Kaycee



With the arrival of a new Rotary year (2023/24), which is typically accompanied by much enthusiasm and a variety of events that promotes camaraderie among Rotarians and non-Rotarians alike, it is expected that Club Presidents who have succeeded their predecessors will be ready to take action after receiving at least two years of training and preparation while ascending the Rotary Club Leadership ladder, from President Nominees to President Elects and now, Presidents.

Consequently, it is now time to begin working towards accomplishing the Club Membership growth targets, alongside other Rotary objectives established by the Clubs.

This column aims to offer support to Clubs and Presidents by providing tips and knowledge on how to attract and retain membership. I wish to discuss the practical steps I implemented to achieve an organic growth rate of almost 150% for my club - Rotary Club of Enugu GRA, during the 2021/22 Rotary year.

Here are some tips that were key for such reports.

1. Make a list of great things about your club:

An understanding of your club's strengths and weaknesses surely helps you know the peculiarities about your

club that you can put forward to your prospects. The Quality and kind of club projects, Meeting Venue, Location, timing, membership quality, and distribution are some factors that can distinguish your club. Knowing your club can inform your decisions on who should be on your Prospect list. On this, bear in mind that most things are strengths if you target the right audience. If your club meets in the morning, you're probably a good fit for someone working 9 to 5. Meet at noon and you're more likely to appeal to retirees or parents of schoolchildren. Not every club is right for every potential member, If someone doesn't fit your format, recommend them to another club. Also keep in mind that the point is not just growing your club, but boosting Rotary's capacity to make a difference in communities around the world. And with any luck, that other club will send you a potential member one day.

2. Keep a list of potential members:

It doesn't matter if it's a paper list or if it's kept on the desktop of your computer. Either way, it makes you think about those people who might be fit for your club. Discuss the list at board meetings — not just the concept of bringing in new members, but the specific names and who's going to contact them and when. And don't overlook some obvious prospects, such as members' spouses, and even former members. Of course, the style of approaching each person on the list should equally be thought out and tactfully executed.

3. Make membership growth your club's top priority:

Make sure every member understands that membership growth is a priority. A President or Membership Chair won't go wrong if he announces his membership intentions to the club and makes it clear, asking for collaboration. The best way to make a Rotary year

easier is to bring in more members. New members brings new energy to a club and mean more people to serve on committees, work on projects and events, and raise money for the Foundation.

4. Look for fresh perspectives:

Club members especially newer members are known to be enthusiastic about their new Rotary experience and can be relied upon to bring in their circle to meetings. Beyond members, Clubs can appeal to their local community and attract them to join the fellowship. Social media is one other great avenue to promote club activities and harvest willing prospects. The idea is to keep talking about Rotary everywhere you go.

5. Realize there is no finish line Even if your club is the optimum size, it's no reason to stop recruiting. There are always reasons people leave. Of the 30 members who joined my club in 2021/2022, some eventually left the club: some had a job transfer, a few had family issues, and others had conflicts with work. A couple simply stopped participating. Among the greater number who remained, one is now the President and the other is our President-Elect. The rest are now very active in leadership roles and are on the Presidential track. What's more, the Club added many more members in the last Rotary year.

The truth is that "You're either growing or you're dying as a club,".

WOMEN AND POLIO



"Why it's important to consider gender at all levels of Eradication work"

How do issues surrounding gender create barriers to polio eradication?

ur ultimate objective is to reach every last child with a polio vaccine. The role of the mother and father in reaching those children is very important, and we must understand the dynamics between them in order to achieve our goal. For example, a mother may want to have her child vaccinated, but that would require her to spend a day walking to a health center or market and she might not be able to do that unless she gets permission from her husband. Or if her child falls ill and experiences paralysis in the arm or leg, the mother might have to seek permission from her husband to take the child to the health center. There could be a delay of several days that would affect our ability to take stool samples and determine whether that child has polio or not.

Do more boys than girls receive vaccines?

On a global level, there is very little discrepancy between reaching boys and girls. You also see a more or less equal distribution of cases of polio between boys and girls. But the global statistics can mask disparities at the local level. We know that we have communities that are not being reached; we need to understand why we're not reaching them. Gender plays a huge role in both supply of and demand for immunization. Who is providing the immunization — a man or a woman? Who is the decision-maker —

mom or dad? And how do the immunizer and the decision-maker work together?

What are the key points in the gender strategy you helped develop for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI)?

The polio program has typically engaged women as frontline health workers because in some cultures, mothers are more likely to open the door to a female vaccinator. But women should not just be part of the delivery of the program. They should also be part of its design; they should be supervisors and team leads, and hold positions at the district level to make sure we are meeting the needs of communities. We also need to understand why we have trouble retaining female vaccinators. We want them to keep working with us.

We must look at our data in a way that allows us to understand the program better and to see where there may be gaps. Collecting and analyzing sex-disaggregated data will help us to understand if gender-related barriers are preventing us from reaching zero-dose children — children who have not received any vaccines — and to refine the way we plan campaigns in those countries.

The GPEI's new strategy places a huge focus on community engagement. We're looking at the supply and demand sides in communities. How do we create a demand that ensures that parents want to take their children to be immunized? We need to make sure that the offered immunization services are acceptable to parents.

Besides gender, are there strategies that focus on other types of diversity?

We're also looking at engaging people with disabilities. And gender also covers economic status: A lot of gender disparities are much more pronounced at different economic levels as well as in different ethnic and age groups. For example, the decision-making power of

women in developing countries who are not educated is more limited, which will impact their ability to make health care decisions for the family. All of those things interact.

In the last mile of eradication, we need to leave no stone unturned to understand which children we are missing and why. Looking at gender is one more way to make sure that we're reaching all children. Fathers have just as much of a role to play as mothers. How do we overcome barriers, so that men are engaged in the decision-making process and so that they allow their children to be immunized?

Rotary is so well-positioned to be a lead on gender. It isn't a women's issue — it's everybody's issue.

He was just being himself, doing something he enjoys doing. Little did he know that the pictures he took of his 3 year old niece, would catapult him to fame as well. The story of his niece is not told without mentioning his name.

INSTALLATION OF THE 7TH DISTRICT ROTARACT REPRESENTATIVE





JOINT MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH PROJECT - ROTARY CLUBS OF UYO CAPITAL CITY & UYO METROPOLIS



ostnatal depredonen (PND) is one of women's most often neglected disorders after giving birth. Conversely, PND is one of the most frequent delivery complications globally, occurring between 10% and 15% of the time(Verinder and Priya, 2012). PND, often known as postpartum depression, is an illness that arises after delivery.

It is produced by distorted mother's emotions and social connection with the child; consequently, the woman feels guilty, overexcited, sleep-deprived, hopeless, loses her appetite, and is terrified.

Furthermore, it leads to insure attachment and negative cognition, which may harm the newborn and the whole



family.In Nigeria, the Edinburgh Postnatal Depression Scale(EDPS) was used to examine the prevalence of PND. PND prevalence varies throughout Nigeria, with 44.5% and 21.8% in Northern Nigeria, 23% and 14.6% in Western Nigeria, and 30% and 10.7% in Southeast Nigeria (Adeyemo et al., 2020).

It is for this reason that, the Rotary Club of Uyo Capital City, in partnership with Rotary Club of Uyo Metropolis, embarked on the "Maternal and Child Health Project" on "Postnatal Depression", having done a feasibility study on the need for the programme.

The project aimed at, awareness talks on Postnatal

depression to pregnant women and nursing mothers at Health Centre, Wellington Bassey Way (Barracks Road) Uyo, Akwa Ibom State, on 19th July, 2023. The women were later presented with gifts items (sanitary packs) for the newborn babies.

The women were happy and shared testimony on how the programme benefitted them and that; as they are informed, they will always seek help early if they experience any of the symptoms they were taught.



BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT FELLOWSHIP - ROTARY CLUB OF OWERRI CENTRAL

RIGHTS:

- The Right to access banking services.
- The Right to privacy or confidentiality your bank is not to divulge your account information to a third party; the bank must also protect your information from unauthorized access by a third party.
- Exemption when ordered by court, case of public good.
- The Right to nondiscrimination.
- The Right to be informed your bank must explain to your understanding all contractual terms and charges prior to the consummation of any agreement or contract.
- The Right to choose you have a right to select from the range of products and services made available by your Bank at competitive prices.
- The Right to transparent and fair practices. It must be clear and readily understandable
- The Right to seek redress and complain. A bank must provide its customer a redress mechanism to express their displeasure or grievance. Your complain should be resolved; where you are not not satisfied with the decision of your bank, you have the right of review either by your bank, the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) or the court.

- The Right to safety this right requires a bank to guarantee all its customer a secure and conducive banking environment devoid of threats to their safety and health.
- The Right to withdraw consent.
- Right to close your account.
- The Right to access your account information.
- The Right to opt-out of unsolicited marketing.
- The Right to interest rate disclosure.
- The Right to information on complaint handling.
- The Right to security of funds.
- The Right to cancel transaction within specific period.
- The Right to consumer education. There's a need for sustained information and education.
- The Right to good service the right to be treated with respect and dignity by banks and their representatives.
- The Right to protection against fraud.
- The Right to joint account.
- The Right to equality it is wrong for a bank to offer preferential treatment to some customers at the expense of other similar kind of customers. However, banks may decide to differentiate customers on account of the nature of products customers purchase or subscribe to.
- The Right to regulatory enforcement.
- The Right to free monthly statement of account - the provision of the Revised Guide to Bank Charges is that banks are required to provide their customers free 2 statement of account on monthly basis.

How Can You Resolve A Complaint?

V Contact the bank and lodge complaint. Document it and the bank should acknowledge it.

V Document all complaints. Always ask for an acknowledgement copy. Know the date, time and person you spoke with.

V Get denial slip from POS if transaction failed.

√ Allow reasonable time - 10 working days.

V Be bold when not properly handled. Ask for the supervisor. Escalate to higher authority

√ Utilize the bank complaint channel.

V Keep reference number of complaint. Ask for when you should follow up for feedback.

√ You can write to consumer protection department of Central Bank when all have failed.

√ For very big cases CBN cannot resolve, you can go to court

√ Use power of Social Media.

° You can negotiate the maintenance charges and management fees

Customer Duties

- Duty of knowledge and understanding. Anything you are doing, you must understand it.
- Duty of financial obligation. You must pay your obligation to the bank.
- Duty to protect instruments and information. It is important to stress that your bank cannot bear responsibility for any loss you incur as a result of your negligence in protecting vital instruments or information.
- Duty to provide factual information and not mislead the bank.
- Duty to report suspected fraud or error.
- Duty to personal safety and safety of assets. It is your duty to protect your assets against theft while on the premises of your bank.



HERBAL TEAS FOR THE MENSTRUAL PHASE



There are five(5) main teas that you should have on rotation during your menstrual phase (aka the days of your bleed/ period) inorder to support a healthy menstruation, whether you suffer from period pain or not: Cramp Bark, Red Raspberry Leaf, Nettle Leaf, Chamomile, and Peppermint.

Nettle Leaf – Nettle Leaf is known for its anti-inflammatory properties which may be helpful in alleviating pain. In addition to that, it is known for boosting the immune system!

Red Raspberry Leaf – Tasting similar to black tea, red raspberry leaf is a classic period tea. It contains vitamins such as vitamin A, vitamin C, and vitamin E and has antioxidant properties. Anecdotal evidence suggests that it may help to reduce menstrual cramps and support a healthy flow.

Chamomile – Chamomile is often used as a "sleepy" tea, but those relaxing benefits can also translate to the uterus. It has been used to help reduce menstrual pain by relaxing the body and decreasing the production of prostaglandins.

Peppermint — I could drink peppermint tea every day because I just love it. This can be super helpful for bloat and digestion issues that some people may notice during menstruation. It also is known to act as a relaxant so may be helpful for things like headaches and muscle cramps.

Let's start early to teach our girls that nature heals!
